Description/content	The PhD programme of the Albrecht Mendelssohn Bartholdy Graduate School of Law is ideal for graduates of law and other disciplines who are keen to pursue ambitious doctoral work in an outstanding, interdisciplinary research environment. Doctoral candidates from all over the world ensure intellectual and international diversity. By cooperating with other university faculties and departments, we foster broad professional and academic development and prepare our students for productive careers. The Albrecht Mendelssohn Bartholdy Graduate School of Law is committed to the principle of equal opportunity in education and employment. Our programme has also been conceived to support the balance between work and family. The faculty has two key research areas:

• international and European public law

1) International, European and transnational law

The faculty has been dealing with the international dimensions of law and legal science since its establishment in 1919. Today, our focus lays on research activities in the following individual areas:

international private law

- comparative law
- international criminal law
- refugee law
- digital law

2) Law in Context

Law in Context bundles research activities associated with the principles and interdisciplinary aspects of law. Particular examples include the following:

- legal history
- philosophy of law
- legal theory
- legal sociology
- · economic analysis of law
- criminology

The Albrecht Mendelssohn Bartholdy Graduate School of Law particularly welcomes interdisciplinary PhD topics from the two areas, but is generally open to all areas of legal science.

The choice of topic and the content orientation will have a bearing on the awarding of scholarships.

Course Details

Course organisation

The PhD programme of the Albrecht Mendelssohn Bartholdy Graduate School of Law consists of two essential elements: thesis preparation and participation in the Graduate School of Law's lecture programme. The latter is designed to accomplish the following:

- support and guide students in their thesis work
- teach students the necessary skills for successful legal scientific research
- broaden students' views and knowledge of law through interdisciplinary courses

In addition to lectures, the Graduate School of Law also offers seminars, research workshops, a colloquium, and method courses. The following courses form the core of the programme and are repeatedly held every year:

- A colloquium that offers students the possibility to present and discuss their research
 projects in front of their supervisors and fellow students is offered. It functions as a forum
 for academic exchange of ideas and views, helps students reflect on their work as well as
 gather input from their colleagues.
- A course on "Legal Research and Writing for PhD Students" is designed to help students
 obtain the necessary skills and knowledge to write their theses. Students are supported in
 formulating their central research questions, structuring their work, and conceptualising
 their research projects. Furthermore, students are taught the guidelines for research
 integrity and good scientific practice as well as search techniques and methods-based
 research.
- A lecture on "The Development of Legal Subdisciplines" sheds light on the historical foundations and development of the respective legal subdisciplines.

Over the past years, several other courses have been offered (on a one-off basis) on the following topics:

- Private Legal Society and its Ideological Foundations
- Natural Law Positivism Post-Positivism
- Global Constitutionalism
- Knowledge and Law
- Institutional Economics in International Law
- Legal Research in a Transnational Context
- Conflicts of Jurisdiction in EU Fundamental Rights Protection
- Workshop on Brexit
- Contemporary Problems of International and Transitional Justice
- Human Dignity, Protection of Personality in Digital Age

The scholarships are awarded for studies at the Albrecht Mendelssohn Bartholdy Graduate School of Law for a maximum period of three years. Scholarships are awarded on the basis of the academic excellence of the applicants and are intended to enable them to write a dissertation and participate in the academic programme of the Albrecht Mendelssohn Bartholdy Graduate School of Law. Requirements / Registration

Academic admission requirements

An outstanding degree in law or a non-legal research-orientated Master's degree is required (in particular in business administration, political science, or sociology). A complete application comprises all required documents, such as

- the completed online application form
- tabular curriculum vitae (optional: index of all publications)
- research proposal (up to four pages)
- personal statement about why you are applying to the Albrecht Mendelssohn Bartholdy Graduate School
- two recommendation letters from professors attesting your suitability for doctoral work

· diploma and transcript of records

Language requirements

Language certificates (German or English): Non-native speakers who write their dissertations in German or English must prove their language skills by submitting relevant certificates.

German: TestDaF or DSH (proving level C1)

English: certificate proving C1 Level of the Common European Framework of Reference for Languages (CEFR). This requires test scores of at least 100 in the TOEFL iBT / 7 in the IELTS / 945 in TOEIC. The TOEFL DI Code is 2258.

Possibility of finding parttime employment

Students who enrol in a full-time programme will generally have only a limited time for part-time jobs. As a rule, students who hold a student residence permit may work for up to 120 full days or 240 half days per year. Accommodation is available through the "Studierendenwerk" (student services) or on the private market. The "Studierendenwerk" provides rooms in halls of residence, most of which are single rooms with shared kitchens and showers/WCs. We strongly advise students and researchers to arrange accommodation prior to arriving in Hamburg, as demand for affordable accommodation is sometimes larger than supply.
