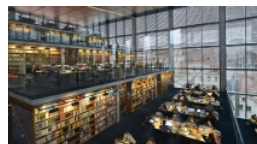
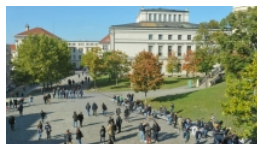

Description/content	The Master's programme in Economics: Data Science and Policy at Martin Luther University Halle-Wittenberg is an internationally recognised, two-year degree programme that provides state-of-the-art education in economics with a particular focus on data science and policy analysis. You will

learn how economists derive insights from data, analyse issues of economic policy, and communicate their research results effectively.

The course of study emphasises a hands-on approach to learning. You will have ample opportunities to actively work on your own projects and to engage in critical thinking in exercises and seminars. The international environment and small class sizes create an interactive and intellectually stimulating atmosphere.

The programme is closely linked to the Halle Institute for Economic Research (Leibniz-Institut für Wirtschaftsforschung Halle, IWH), an internationally renowned economic research institute located in Halle. IWH staff members both contribute to the curriculum and supervise programme interns at the institute. The close connection with the IWH will give you the opportunity to gain insights into real-world policy consulting and to attend research seminars with international speakers.

Course Details

Course organisation

The programme consists of three main building blocks. First, you will study advanced, state-of-the-art concepts of micro- and macroeconomics. Second, modules in economic data science provide a systematic and comprehensive introduction to key statistical methods and software. Third, you will learn how to apply economic expertise in evidence-based economic policy analysis.

The modules in this programme cover a wide range of subject areas and allow you to engage in applied labour and health economics, monetary economics, development economics, and more. For details, please see our sample curriculum below.

Requirements / Registration

Academic admission requirements

- Bachelor's degree or equivalent (minimum GPA of 2.5 on the German scale, i.e., "good")
- 60 ECTS/credits of economics/business-related classes in your Bachelor's degree
- Proof of proficiency in English (TOEFL, IELTS, Cambridge)

Language requirements We require good command of the English language that is documented by TOEFL (iBT min. 72), IELTS (min. 6.0), or similar test results. For a list of recognised proofs of proficiency, please visit our website.

We do **not** require any previous knowledge of German.

Application deadline The following application deadlines apply:

- Applicants who obtained their Bachelor's degree or equivalent in Germany must apply by 15 July.
- Applicants who obtained their Bachelor's degree or equivalent abroad must apply by 15 June.

Possibility of finding part-time employment International students have the option to work as interns at numerous companies in Halle and Leipzig. Outstanding students may also be hired as tutors or assistants by various chairs at the faculty or at the economic research institute located in Halle.

Despite its name, Martin Luther University Halle-Wittenberg is a secular university that looks back on a long tradition. It offers a complete range of studies in law, economics, humanities, and the sciences. There are currently more than 20,000 students who are enrolled in nine different faculties. The Faculty of Law, Economics, and Business is the largest faculty, with about 5,000 students.

As a student, you will have access to many classes offered by other faculties, and you will be encouraged to enhance your understanding of economics and business management with insights from different fields. You will also be able to engage in a large number of extracurricular activities, ranging from university sports to representing the student body as an elected member of the student council.



University location

The city of Halle is the largest and most densely populated city in the state of Saxony-Anhalt and lies on the banks of the Saale river. It is an important historical and economically aspiring city in the heart of Germany. Since the reunion, Halle has been transformed from a former East German chemistry metropolis into a town of education and sciences. With its university and two colleges, renowned research institutions for economics and biosciences, and a booming logistics industry, it is one of the thriving cities in the region. The beautiful scenery and parks, which are inviting locations for sports or a barbecue with friends, as well as numerous cafés, bars, and clubs make Halle

an attractive place to study.

Halle's rich 1,200-year history is reflected in its large variety of cultural opportunities and architectural monuments such as the Moritzburg and Giebichenstein Castle, the Cathedral, the Halloren and Saltworks Museums and the Franckesche Stiftungen as a UNESCO World Heritage site – to name only a few. These old, intricately restored buildings from different epochs along with attractive, modern architecture make for a unique townscape. As the birthplace of Georg-Friedrich Händel, Halle is also the acknowledged cultural capital of Saxony-Anhalt and a distinctive arts community. The Opera House and the Händel Auditorium as well as numerous other theatres and stages have much to offer to the inclined audience.

Apart from the local attractions, Halle is a great starting point to do more travelling in Germany. You can easily reach every other city via two major interstate highways, railway or the Leipzig-Halle Airport.
