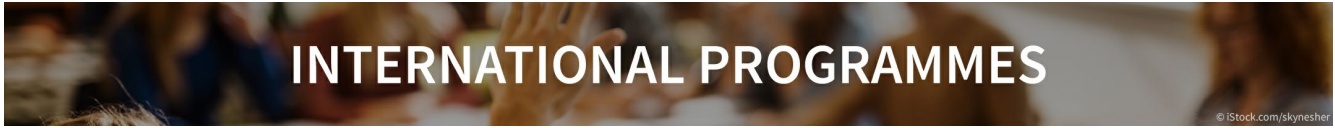

Description/content	<p>The English and American Studies degree programme provides students with fundamental knowledge in literature, cultural studies, and linguistics, focusing on the Anglophone world. The University of Bayreuth, whose humanities and social sciences participate actively in the "Africa Multiple" Cluster of Excellence, emphasises interdisciplinary and transcultural approaches. Graduates from the programme will be able to participate in the ever more necessary economic and cultural exchange between nations.</p> <p>Structure and contents</p> <p>In the course of their studies, students choose one of three areas of specialisation:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• English studies (emphasis on English literature and cultural studies)• American Studies (emphasis on American literary and cultural studies)• Linguistics (focus on English linguistics) <p>In addition, the course offers elective modules (e.g. research communication, interdisciplinary orientation, or an additional foreign language) as well as a range of minor subjects that further increase multidisciplinary competence. The programme allows you to put together a curriculum that suits your needs and objectives within this framework.</p>

You are building your profile – the minor.

Right at the beginning of your studies, when you enrol in the English and American Studies Bachelor's programme, you will select a minor worth 49 credit points. The minor is fully integrated into the course of study. Minor subjects interconnect areas of expertise or broaden subject-specific competencies. One thing you need to know right from the beginning: most minors are taught in German, so an excellent command (B2) of both German and English is a requirement for entering the programme.

For the English and American Studies Bachelor's programme, you can choose from the following minors:

- Applied Computer Science – Multimedia
- Arabic and Islamic Language and Culture Studies
- Didactics of German as a Second Language

Course Details

Course organisation

The programme in the major is built upon four module areas:

1. Foundational Studies ("Fachwissenschaftliche Grundlagen", 40 CP)
2. Specialised Studies ("Fachwissenschaftliche Spezialisierung", 37 CP)
3. Language Proficiency in English ("sprachpraktische Ausbildung", 24 CP)
4. Interdisciplinary Competencies ("Fachübergreifende Kompetenzen", 30 CP)

Depending on the interests and objectives of individual students, interdisciplinary competencies provide connections to other fields of study, or they give students the opportunity to acquire competence in another language. This module area also contains a choice between an internship or study abroad (individually organised with help from career services or the international office).

Costs / Funding

Tuition fees per semester in EUR	None
Semester contribution	In Germany, students at all higher education institutions pay a semester contribution. This payment (University of Bayreuth: 116.03 EUR per semester) has nothing to do with tuition fees; rather, it covers your contributions to student services and the student government. At the University of Bayreuth (which combines the campus in Bayreuth and our Faculty VII located in Kulmbach), it includes a "semester ticket" that allows you to use public transport in the region.

Costs of living The cost of living in Germany, e.g. accommodation, food, clothing and recreational activities, is about average compared to other European countries. Living expenses are significantly lower than in countries like Denmark, Luxembourg or Switzerland, but they are rather high compared to countries like Poland, the Czech Republic or Italy. Compared to other large German cities, such as Munich, Berlin or Hamburg, Bayreuth's low cost of living and affordable housing make the city and the region particularly attractive to young people and families. Funding opportunities within the university	Yes
Description of the above-mentioned funding opportunities within the university	<p>Scholarships for international students: International students and doctoral researchers have the opportunity to apply to the International Office for a study grant. Limited funding from the State of Bavaria and the DAAD is available for this purpose. The application deadline for the winter semester is 31 August and for the summer semester 28 February. All grants can be awarded for up to two semesters.</p> <p>Unfortunately, first-semester students cannot be funded, i.e. applications cannot be submitted until the second semester of study for funding starting in the third semester of study. Above all, academic achievements from the previous semester are decisive for the evaluation of the application.</p>

Requirements / Registration

Academic admission requirements	Academic admission requirements include a university entrance qualification. (More specific information is available in German. Please ask about your specific case if you have any questions.): "allgemeine bzw. einschlägige fachgebundene Hochschulreife oder berufliche Qualifikation "
Language requirements	Excellent competence in English is a prerequisite, but it is assumed to be part of secondary school training. German level B2 is a requirement to enter the programme (due to study regulations for all programmes that have German components).
